

Investigate, review, and inspect the administrative conduct of public sector agencies, and provide advice and guidance to ensure people are treated fairly.

## International and national obligations

- An international human rights obligation
  - United Nations Optional Protocol to the Convention against Torture and other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment 2002 (OPCAT)
- Legislated in NZ
  - Crimes of Torture Act 1989 (COTA)
  - National Preventive Mechanism (NPM)
- Focus on prevention
  - Recommendations to establish and maintain safeguards and good practise
  - Prevent cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment
     not just torture




## Who is a detainee? What is a place of detention?



My focus: detained people in detention facilities

"... for the purpose of examining and monitoring the treatment of persons detained:

... in health and disability places of detention **including** within privately run aged care facilities" New Zealand Gazette (6 June 2018)



## Monitoring prisons and mental health facilities ...

- Conduct regular inspections
  - Unrestricted access to facility
  - Some unannounced
  - Visit each facility at least 1 x every 4 years
- Gather and analyse evidence
  - Unrestricted access to information
  - Facility data and records
  - Observations
  - Input from staff, detainees, family, visitors, and others (interviews, surveys etc)
  - Assess against my inspection criteria and international best practise standards
- Make recommendations and report
- Follow up visits, if required

#### **Considerations:**

- Treatment of detainees
- Legality of detention
- Facility's protective measures
- Detainees' material conditions
- Detainees' regimes and activities
- Detainees' access to health care
- Staffing


#### Who is involved ...

- National Preventive Mechanism (NPM)
- Core team of inspectors (OPCAT team)
  - Mental health and disability
  - Social work
  - Prison operation and management
- Assisted by (composition depending on facility being visited)
  - Specialist advisors (medical, cultural, social expertise etc)
  - Former detainees
  - Advocates



#### Where we've been and what we've found ...

#### **Detention facilities visited (formal & informal) in 2016/17**



#### Key issues identified

- Balance prisons and health and disability facilities
- Private dementia facilities
- Prison At Risk Units
- Mental health
- Intellectual disability
- Ability to monitor change.

Inspections at least 12-18 months away

Work out the details

Confirm our role

Get funding

Ombudsman

## Answers to some common questions ...

- Parliament pays
- Monitoring programme & inspection criteria yet to be determined
- Looking at conditions and treatment, not standards and systems
- Prevention, not complaints
- Detained people in detention facilities, not all residents in all residential care
- Case by case basis required to determine who is 'detained' in non-secure aged care facilities
